PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2019

Season 2019 was another successful year for the VAFAUA, with our first full season at the redeveloped EP. I'm sure plenty of us appreciated the nice running surface through the preseason and the removal of the infamous 'hole' between the goals! With the new VAFA HQ pavilion completed, we were able to hold more events in the large (and warm) social room. The 2020 committee will have the opportunity to continue to make the most of access to this space and provide even more great events for our members.

I'd like to acknowledge the time and effort put in by the entire Committee, and especially by Secretary Michael Gough and Treasurer Mitsuo Nire. The workload can be relentless at times, and their dedication and willingness to put in the long hours must be appreciated by us all. I'd also like to particularly acknowledge Will Houston for his work as Social Secretary, particularly for going above and beyond to feed us all after training.

After a number of years on the committee Michael, Mitsuo and I have decided to step down from our roles as Secretary, Treasurer and President. Mitsuo leaves with our finances in excellent shape – our debts repaid and a healthy cash position for the association to invest in umpiring however we, as members, decide. Michael leaves with our databases up to date, sponsorship arrangements in place, and two more seasons of pay rates, including significant raises, locked in. The importance of this solid position should not be underestimated.

We received multiple members nominate for positions on the committee, including for President, Secretary, and General Committee. It is heartening to see so many members wanting to get involved in progressing the association. It is always difficult voting on our representative positions, as we are choosing between really good candidates who are often our friends. To those who were unsuccessful this time around, I thank you for putting your hand up, and encourage you to remain involved. Many of our most vital contributors are not committee members, and I hope you continue to support the association in 2020 and beyond.

Congratulations to Andrew Hartnett, Hannah Bailes, Patrick Mathews & Josh Colman, who take up the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer roles respectively. Congratulations also to Campbell Hymans and Jack Maclean, who join the committee for the first time. They are all outstanding members who bring enthusiasm and a desire to make umpiring better for us all. I know we will all get behind them and support them in this aim. Our Association is in great hands.

Social

On the social front, we had another successful year lead by Social Secretary Will Houston. Continuing on from 2018, we were able to provide a free meal after training, and we were delighted to see more and more umpires staying back after training to socialise and have something to eat and drink.

Following feedback from 2018 we continued to evolve our Awards Night, returning to a sitdown event but retaining some key initiatives from our cocktail evening. As always, the night was well attended, and we were pleased to receive very positive feedback. The 2020 committee

will continue to evolve the night to ensure that it appeals to our diverse membership. Our huge thanks must once again go to Lionel Katz for arranging this wonderful night.

Feedback through our annual survey also showed that we want more opportunities to get to know other umpires in our squad. The goal umpire group has been having a highly successful dinner for a number of years now, and the committee has looked into how this can be expanded into the other squads. We trialled this with the premier field umpires, and a great night was had by all. With the goal and premier field umpire dinners now established, expect to see similar events across all the groups in the coming year.

With dwindling numbers at our Trivia Night over the last few years, the committee looked at how we can reinvigorate what has traditionally been a wonderful night. Due to timing we were unable to execute our plan for 2019, but you can expect to see a new format trivia night much earlier in the year in 2020, providing a great way to get to know our new umpires, catch up with old friends, and get our social season off to a great start.

I'm frequently reminded that the footy club (and umpiring) environment is not about making 'winter friendships', but to grow lasting connections for life. We're very pleased to hear that many of the 'plus-ones' at our social events are now keeping in touch, and we hope this continues to grow. Active involvement of parents, partners and friends makes our Association stronger.

Women in Football

The VAFAUA has a long history of women umpiring in our competition, including at the highest level. In 2019 the VAFAUA initiated a Women's Academy, which we achieved with the support of the VAFA and our valued sponsor BJS. The VAFA are well aware of how vital this initiative is, and I'm delighted that the management of the program will be handed to the VAFA in 2020. The VAFA plans to dedicate additional resources to the Academy, and they have some great ideas to make the VAFA the place to umpire for women of all ages and abilities. Thank you to Hannah Bailes, Asha Hinton and all our female members for banding together to help make the UA even more welcoming to new umpires.

I encourage all umpires to consider your networks and think if there are any women you know that would like to take up umpiring. The more female members the Association has, the stronger we will be!

The Future

Over my three years as President, I've become acutely aware of how diverse our membership, and their wants and needs, really are. While our purpose for umpiring has remained fairly constant – mateship, fitness, participation and being a part of the football community – what umpires think that looks like is changing and we must keep pace.

To our 'experienced' umpires, I say that it would be a mistake to think that fewer people staying late into the night after training is a mark of lower engagement with the UA. For example, 20 years ago the first opportunity many umpires had to talk about their match was on the next training night. Now, social media and VAFA TV mean that many umpires are in almost constant contact – decisions have been discussed with peers and general gasbagging has

occurred well before Monday night rolls around. The socialising mightn't be as visible, but it is most definitely occurring.

To our younger umpires – I encourage you to step out of your iPhone comfort zone and stay around after training on the odd night to get to know more of your peers. While umpiring can be 'transactional', and you can just come to umpire on the weekends, you're missing out on the real value that is offered by the UA. We have an amazing group of experienced umpires and listening to the 'war stories' is one of the best ways to learn about match management and the umpiring world. You'll also meet some amazing people, and perhaps learn a thing or two about life (and some great networking skills) along the way. The particular challenge of the UA committee is to bring the two worlds together, and make sure that everyone is catered for.

Finally, I'd like to say thank you to everyone for the opportunity to serve as the President of our Association for the last three years. I owe a huge debt of gratitude to all that have served on the committee over that time, and to all of you who have supported me along the way. It has been a privilege to represent our amazing association, and I look forward to being a member of it for many years to come.

I pass the baton to Andrew Hartnett, and I know he is a great fit for the role.

We have a growing and diverse group of member umpires, with increasing female participation as a result of initiatives by the Umpires Association. Our alumni umpires are going from strength to strength, and our umpiring standards are as high as ever. What a great time to be an umpire. Bring on 2020!

SECRETARY'S REPORT 2019

Season 2019 was undoubtedly one of the more successful years for the VAFAUA during my time at the competition. Post-training attendances were up on previous years together with interactions on our various social media platforms.

Social media interactions were up over 50% over the course of the season together with increased engagement for the entire running cohort.

Our member databases were again updated, consolidated and checked for accuracy. The improved member database allows for more accurate record keeping and the ability to target our emails and digital content to dedicated and focused subject groups. Whilst not finalized during my term, it is incumbent on the future Secretary of the Association to continue to build on this database and particularly develop the PUMPs records.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2019

The Association's financial year is 1 November to 31 October and therefore the Financial Statements enclosed in this Annual Report reflect the activities of the Umpire's Association for the entire 2019 football season. This was my sixth consecutive and final year as Treasurer.

As presented at the May 2019 Annual General Meeting, our 2019 surplus expectation was between the range of \$1,000 to \$3,000. The Association's net financial surplus for the year of \$935 was on the lower end of our expectations.

The committee believes however that this surplus should still be viewed as a highly favourable outcome, considering that some of the key initiatives made by the 2019 Committee to benefit the group was known to come at a financial cost. Some of these initiatives were as follows:

- We reduced the prices of umpires uniform (targeting goal umpires uniforms) to make the upfront costs more viable for newly joined umpires during the year;
- We decided to make all food and beverage provided at Wednesday night training free of charge to promote engagement and attendance after training sessions; and
- We increased the cleaning frequency of our umpires pavilion to ensure higher standards.

As my tenure as Treasurer of the VAFAUA comes to a close, it has been a pleasure to have served on the Committee for the last six and a half years. I am appreciative of the support that the Presidents, members of the Committee and the umpires' group have provided me as we worked together to improve the financial position of the Association and optimized the operation of our financial management platforms, to effective cloud-based products and services such as Xero, Shopify, CommBiz and the Commonwealth Bank Albert tablet.

I thank our incoming Treasurer, Josh Colman, for offering his services to the Association for 2020 and I am confident that the Association will continue to flourish as a reputable, professional Umpires' Association under his stewardship.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (the Act). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements:

(a) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognizing revenue. Interest revenue is recognized using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Amounts disclosed include goods and services tax.

(b) Inventory

Inventories including bar stock, merchandise and sporting equipment are expensed when sold and are measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Inventories expected to be carried and sold over future years are capitalized as required.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONT)

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

(d) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Leasehold improvements and equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, less any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciation amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use on a straight line method.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Property, plant and equipment Depreciation Rate

Buildings 2.5%
Building improvements 2.5%
Furniture & fittings 6.5%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

Asset classes' carrying amounts are written down immediately to its recoverable amount if an asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the income statement.

(e) Intangible assets

Intangibles are amortised on a straight line basis over the period of their expected benefit. The assets' carrying amount and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.
